Pastor's Pen

The Ending Gives Value to the Beginning And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you

will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ. (Philippians 1:6)

There's a saying I've heard among the running culture for the last thirty years. It's aimed at motivating a runner. It's designed to give perspective on the training one does. And it reveals where the true work begins and the ultimate benefit lies. Here's the saying:

"Work the first two-thirds for the reward of the last one-third."

In other words, while a whole workout is of value, the early portion fatigues us for the fitness achieved in the latter portion. The real strength and growth comes as we persevere through the end. It's the ending that gives value to the beginning.

This is the meaning of the verse above. The Apostle Paul, writing to the church in the city of Philippi, encouraged God's people with this message of hope and this assurance of God's faithfulness. As a matter of fact, Paul expressed this as a truth in which he was absolutely confident. To him, this was a done deal and a finished fact. Paul knew that God always



finishes what he starts, completes what he commences, delivers on what he declares.

Notice, also, what God does in those who know and love him is called "a good work." God is the fountain of all things good. God is the giver of all good gifts. God's own character is described as goodness itself, in which there is no shifting shadow or guile or maliciousness. God is good! Therefore, what God does in us as followers of Christ is also good. No matter the trials and challenges of the earlier stages of life, in the end good is the result all God does in us.



Perhaps you need no reminding, but summer ends this month. School is back in session. Schedules settle back into a predictable rhythm and routine. Life plods on. Too easily, the refreshing and renewal of summer begins to fade, giving way to the later seasons of the year. Weariness in the latter seasons of the year, and the latter seasons of life, can settle over us. We need to be reminded and renewed in the assurance of the hope God offers us in Christ. Remember the

promise stated above. God always finishes what he starts. For this reason, we can be assured that the end of things will always give value to the beginning.

Children

Children's Sunday School - This class is designed for young children ages 3 through 5th grade and our youth grades 6th through 12th. Children are invited and welcomed to Sunday School at 9:45 a.m. downstairs in classroom # 3. We explore God's word through a guided curriculum, engage in God's word through studying and reflection of the message, and further explore through stimulating activities. We are currently studying through Faith Alive.

Children's Church - A special time of worship for children during the 11:00 a.m. service. Parents with children ages 3 through 5th grade are encouraged to have your children join us for a special time of worship during the 11:00 a.m. service. Children begin with Children's time each Sunday in the sanctuary. During the 2nd and 4th Sunday of each month, Children Grades 1-5 are encouraged to attend the Young Explorer's Class in the Library. Nursery is available for younger children every Sunday. During this time, children will continue with praise & worship, learn about God's Word, and engage in related activities.

Youth Group-Youth ministry is more than programs and events. Our purpose and goal is to reach out to the young people of our church and community to know the grace and love of our Savior, Jesus Christ. We meet every Friday at 7:00 p.m. in the Parlor. The youth will be encouraged to have a greater sense of their community by engaging in community service activities. We will also plan to have weekly studies and application of God's Word, monthly youth outings, lock-ins, and other activities that will drive our youth to come closer with one another and most importantly closer to our Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ.

Adult II Sunday School - Meets in the Library, under the leadership of Betty Muse. Studying The Present Word, Uniform Series published by the PCUSA. The study involves a direct Bible Study, understanding the Bible in relation to our lives and life experiences and developing an awareness of God's love through his son, Jesus

Koinonia Sunday School - Meets in the parlor, under the leadership of Reverend Bob Williams-Neal. Drawn from a spectrum of Trinity members, this class offers you a lively, in-depth exploration of Scripture. In the past we have studied Acts, Galatians, Daniel and now we are engaging Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther. The class is an open gathering of people with different perspectives and insights and you are invited to join in. Koinonia makes use of one or two resource books and information for other sources. Of course, the class is more than just study. "Koinonia" means community and that is what you are invited to be a part of: a gathering of people who study, pray, and grow together. Come in. There is always a seat open.

Men's Sunday School - Meets downstairs in classroom #4. This men's only class has open discussion about God's Word. This class is designed to reach out to men and to effectively help grow through the grace and knowledge of God's Word. We study the Bible to find strength and courage in supporting one another in our daily walk with God. Seeking in prayer and fellowship, we seek to pursue true Biblical principles regarding our leadership as men in the home, church, and the community. Currently, study is in What We Hold in Common as Presbyterians and What Are the Essential Doctrines of Christians.

Women's Sunday School - Meets downstairs in classroom #6, under the leadership of Jeanette Priebe. The purpose of this class is to bring women together to support one another in building their faith in Jesus Christ. Through our discussions and our prayer time together, we have developed a real love for each other and would love to have you join in as we journey together. This is a fun-loving group of women who empowers and encourages each other. They will be studying *Prayer* by Phillip Yancy.

Small Groups

Men's Small Group- On the first and third Tuesday of each month, the men of Trinity gather together for coffee, fellowship, and an appetite for the Bible. We meet at Wild Eggs restaurant off of English Station Rd. at 8:30 a.m. Our study and time together will be a tremendous encouragement to grow as a godly man. Worship music

Hymns and their meaning in our lives today.

I have thoroughly enjoyed receiving and singing your summer hymn selections. I am reminded every time I get one of your requests how meaningful these songs of our faith are to us. Not only are these songs meaningful to each of us but they are like a personal possession that we hold very dear.

We discover that many of our favorites come from several centuries ago and some even from ancient times. We learn the stories of those who wrote the words and/or the tunes and often times the interesting tales of how words and tunes met many years after their creation.

What do these "old" words mean and what do they reveal about God's character?

My husband's grandmother lived well into her 90's and was very vital until her last year. We would often visit her on Sunday afternoons at her nursing home. We would find her, head bent, sitting in her wheel chair in the common area but very unaware of anything going on around her. We would wheel her near to the piano and I would play and Noel and our 5 children would sing hymns. It only took a minute or two of listening until Grandma Mamie was singing along.....seemingly her old self. The hymns deeply imbedded in her mind and heart and the melodies so familiar brought her back for a few moments. I can't explain it and neurologists attempt to explain it but often fall short. I have read many articles about music and the brain but one study of Alzheimer's patient's states, "that God calls to us to remember Him in the midst of our difficulties". We have discovered that many of the stories of the hymn writers reveal that their words came to them in moments of extreme difficulty and struggle.

In God's infinite wisdom He gives us music and the word, together, in the songs of our faith to forever remind us that, "Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus."

My favorite, Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing

Words written by Robert Robinson- C. Michael Hawn writes of Robinson-"Perhaps all hymns are to some extent autobiographical in that they reveal something of the author's spiritual experience. Such is the case with British Baptist hymn writer Robert Robinson (1735-1790) who as a barber's apprentice, fell under the powerful influence of George Whitefield's preaching."

Robinson had lost his father at a very young age and was later sent to London to be an apprentice. It was during this time that he fell in with some unsavory characters until he heard George Whitefield preach. He came to repentance after listening to Whitefield and became a pastor. Robinson first preached at a Calvinistic Methodist chapel but was re-baptized in 1759 after taking up Baptist Theological perspectives.

From 1761-1790 he was pastor of Stone Yard Baptist Church in Cambridge where despite his lack of formal education he rose to great prominence as a preacher and a scholar.

I encourage you to listen to a recording of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir singing Mack Wilberg's arrangement of this wonderful hymn, Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing. The tune is Nettleton by John Wyeth written in 1757. You can find it easily on YouTube.
